Session A 13 Steps to a Super Student Government (9:30 a.m. to 10:45 a.m. — BANQUET ROOM)

And just because you control millions in student fees, get quoted on the front page of the campus paper, or are a minor celebrity in your own mind doesn't mean that you're truly appreciated, respected, and actually get things done for those you mean to serve: your fellow students. The nation's "Super SGs" have some key characteristics in common. This is your chance to finally find out how yours stacks up against the best. Session D Who Cares? Transforming Apathy Into Action

It is a primary goal of most effective student governments to effectively mobilize their student body to participate actively in events, elections, projects, and to truly care about their school. Session E

The 25 Worst Mistakes Your Student Government Can Make

- Know how to gather and analyze the results and use them to initiate changes



Hail to the Chief: The Power and Purpose of Being **SG President**
